Boundary Description

The Jennie Lakes Wilderness is located in the Sequoia National Forest, Tulare County, State of California. The following description refers to the attached map titled "Jennie Lakes Wilderness" dated 2-12-86.

Beginning at a point at the section corner common to Sections 7, 8, 17 and 18 of T.14S., R.30E., MDM;

thence, westerly to a point on the north boundary of Sec. 14, T.14S., R.29E., MDM, at the 8400' contour line;

thence, southwesterly along said contour to a point in SE 1/4 SE 1/4, Section 15;

thence, northwesterly to a point on the hydrographic divide between Stony Creek and Big Meadows Creek, south of Fox Meadow;

thence, westerly and southerly along said hydrographic divide to a high point with an elevation of 8317 feet;

thence, southwesterly down a ridge to a high point with an elevation of 8,113 feet;

thence, southeasterly and southerly along the hydrographic divide between Woodward Creek and Stony Creek to a point on the 7600 contour line near the center of Section 28, T.14S., R.29E., MDM;

thence, southeasterly along the top of a spur ridge through Section 28, to a point in Stony Creek approximately 400' north of the section corner common to Sections 27, 28, 33 and 34, T.14S., R.29E., MDM;

thence, southeasterly up a spur ridge to a point on the 7440' contour line;

thence, southeasterly to a saddle on the hydrographic divide between Stony Creek and Cabin Creek, approximately 700' northeasterly of a high point with an elevation of 7683 feet;

thence, northeasterly, easterly and northerly along the hydrographic divide, separating the Sequoia National Forest from the Sequoia National Park and Kings Canyon National Park, passing through J.O. Pass, to a point between Sections 3 and 4, T.14S., R.30E., MDM, said point being on the westerly spur of Mitchell Peak;

thence, westerly through Marvin Pass to the top of Mt. Maddox;

thence, southwesterly down a spur of Mt. Maddox to its intersection with the west boundary of Section 8, T.14S., R.30E., MDM;

thence, southerly to the section corner common to said Sections 7, 8, 17 and 18, the point of beginning.

The above-described area has been plotted on a 1-inch-equals-1-mile scale map which is attached to and made a part of this description.

Contains approximately 10,289 acres, all National Forest land.
