

MOUNT NAOMI WILDERNESS
LEGAL DESCRIPTION

The area included in the Mount Naomi Wilderness is located on the Cache National Forest, Intermountain Region, Rich County, Utah, according to the "Utah Wilderness Act of 1984." The official boundary description and maps on which the boundary is shown are on file and available in the offices of the Forest Supervisor, Wasatch-Cache National Forest, Salt Lake City, Utah, and the Regional Forester, Intermountain Region, Ogden, Utah. The Wilderness consists of an area of 44,563 acres, more or less, which was computed from 1:24,000 scale 7 1/2' quadrangle maps using the Forest's Geographical Information System (GIS). A detailed description of the boundary follows:

BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION:

Beginning at a point on the west line of the E1/2 of Section 25, Township 12 North, Range 1 East, Salt Lake Base & Meridian, Cache County, Utah on a ridge which is approximately north 1,000 feet from the south 1/4 corner of said section;

thence approximately north 3,000 feet along the west line of said E1/2 of Section 25 to the easterly easement line of a powerline;

thence approximately N 16° E, 1,100 feet along said easement line to the north line of said Section 25;

thence approximately east 2,300 feet along the north line of said Section 25 to the southwest corner of Section 19, T12N R2E;

thence approximately north 3,200 feet along the west line of said Section 19 to a point which is 300 feet southerly from the centerline of the road in GREEN CANYON;

thence northeasterly approximately 5.5 miles, 300 feet southerly from and parallel with said GREEN CANYON road and trail, to the bottom of a draw at approximate elevation 6,800 feet in the NE1/4SE1/4 of Section 3, T12N R2E;

thence ascending northeasterly approximately 1,700 feet along a ridge line to elevation 7,600 feet;

thence approximately N 73° W, 3,200 feet to the top of a knob at elevation 7,670 feet;

thence northwesterly and northeasterly approximately 4,400 feet along a ridge line to elevation 8,600 feet;

thence approximately N 25° W, 2,700 feet to the bottom of WATER CANYON at elevation 8,000 feet;

thence approximately N 48° W, 2,200 feet to the top of a knob between WATER CANYON and DRY CANYON at approximate elevation 8,930 feet;

thence southwesterly approximately 5.6 miles along the main ridge line northwest of GREEN CANYON to the National Forest Boundary on the west line of Section 19, at a point approximately 400 feet south of the northwest corner of said section;

thence generally northerly approximately 6.5 miles along the National Forest boundary to a point on the west line of Section 19, T13N R2E, at a point 100 feet south of the centerline of the road and trail in BIRCH CANYON;

thence easterly approximately 2.1 miles, 100 feet southerly from and parallel with said road and trail, to a point near the east line of Section 20 on a ridge line;

thence north approximately 200 feet, crossing BIRCH CANYON, to a point 100 feet northerly from the trail in BIRCH CANYON;

thence westerly approximately 2.1 miles, 100 feet northerly from and parallel with said road and trail, to the west line of said Section 19, the National Forest Boundary;

thence generally northerly approximately 2.1 miles along the National Forest Boundary to a point on the west line of Section 17, which is 100 feet south of the centerline of road in SMITHFIELD CANYON;

thence northeasterly approximately 3.2 miles, 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the centerline of said road, to elevation 6,600 feet near THE GROTTTO;

thence west approximately 200 feet to a point which is 100 feet west of the centerline of the road/trail in said canyon;

thence southwesterly approximately 3.2 miles, 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the centerline of the road and trail in SMITHFIELD CANYON, to the west line of Section 17 at a point 100 feet north of said road;

thence generally northerly approximately 9.8 miles along the boundary between private and National Forest System lands to a point on the south line of Section 5, T14N R2E;

thence north approximately 600 feet to a point which is a 100 feet south of the center line of the road in HIGH CREEK;

thence easterly approximately 2.5 miles, 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the centerline of said road, to elevation 6,040 feet, above the intersection of LITTLE LEFT HAND FORK and NORTH BEAR CANYON;

thence northerly approximately 500 feet along elevation 6,040 feet to a point which is north 100 feet from the centerline of the road in HIGH CREEK;

thence westerly approximately 2.5 miles, 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the centerline of said road, to the east line of Section 5;

thence generally westerly and northerly approximately 1.3 miles along the boundary between private and National Forest System lands to the UTAH - IDAHO STATE LINE;

thence east approximately 3,000 feet along the state line to a ridge line at approximate elevation 6,800 feet;

thence easterly and southeasterly approximately 1.8 miles along a ridge line to the top of a peak at approximate elevation 8,500 feet;

thence approximately S 82° E, 1.8 miles to a peak at elevation 9,454 feet;

thence southerly approximately 7.6 miles along the main ridge line of the BEAR RIVER RANGE divide to the top of a peak at elevation 9,676 feet, said peak bears approximately southeast, 1.1 miles from NAOMI PEAK;

thence southeasterly approximately 5.5 miles along the main ridge line which is easterly above COTTONWOOD CANYON to the top of a knob at elevation 7,481 feet;

thence approximately S 76° W, 4,600 feet, crossing COTTONWOOD CANYON, to the top of a knob at elevation 7,214 feet;

thence westerly approximately 1.7 miles along a ridge line to a peak at elevation 9,065 feet;

thence southwesterly approximately 7.3 miles along the main ridge line between LOGAN CANYON and GREEN CANYON over BEIRDNEAU PEAK to a point 100 feet northeasterly from a communications site;

thence southwesterly approximately 200 feet, maintaining 100 feet from said communication site, returning to said ridge line;

thence southwesterly approximately 1.5 miles along said ridge line to the point of beginning.

Qualifications

All information was taken from 1:24,000 Primary Base Series quadrangle maps which were mapped, edited, and published by the U.S. Geological Survey, and modified by the Forest Service Geomtronics Service Center using 1985 photography and 1986 correction guides furnished by the Intermountain Region.

This boundary description has been plotted on a set of U.S. Geological Survey 1:24,000 scale 7 1/2' quadrangle maps which are reduced to a 1-inch-equals-1-mile map entitled "Mount Naomi Wilderness" Wasatch-Cache National Forest, Intermountain Region, dated August 30, 1988, which is attached and made part of this description.
